# A Thousand Years of History....

On April 6th a celebration was held in Romsey Town Hall to mark the merging of the previous Romsey and Romsey Extra parishes into the new, enlarged, Romsey parish. Speaking at the event was our local historian Phoebe Merrick and, as you would expect, extremely knowledgeable she was too! We learnt from her that the roots of Romsey (Town) and Romsey Extra parishes go back a thousand years to when the 'centre' was land owned by the Abbey (known as Romsey Infra) with the land beyond that being known as Romsey Extra. The words Infra and Extra referring to whether the land was inside or outside the bridge over the local river – a bridge that was roughly where Boots the chemist is today.

The Victorians used this distinction when they set up the two parishes in the 19th century, creating (as they did all over England) an urban central parish (Romsey), surrounded by a rural parish (Romsey Extra). As urban development has spread, and both rural economies and transport have changed beyond all recognition, these two-parish combinations have made less and less sense – with our own Romsey Extra being reduced several times over the years as parts of it were absorbed by Romsey town.

This culminated in the government's Boundary Commissioners recommending, a few years ago, the merger that we have just seen.

As a parish precept (the small part of your council tax bill that is used to fund your parish council) must be standard across the whole of a parish, this does mean that those who lived in Romsey Extra parish (such as myself!) underwent a sudden increase from the rate for a rural parish to that of an urban parish. But given that the increase was far less than a pound a week for each household – and given that most of the recent public facilities made available to Romsey residents are in Romsey Extra – hopefully this one-off increase is not seen as too unfair. And it does also mean that the new expanded Romsey parish now has money set aside for improvements to footpaths, signage etc. around the parish.

To mark what was a genuinely historic occasion, on the list of past Romsey Mayors that is displayed in the Council Chamber of the town hall, there will be a line under my name (marking where there was a marked change in our local government) and alongside it a box with a bit more about the history, photographs from April 6th, and the now unused medal of the Chair of Romsey Extra parish.

Also, that weekend is the popular four-day, family run, New Forest Folk Festival at their farm in Plaitford. A mix of great music, home cooked food, and obligatory cider!

The bed race and Romsey Carnival comes to town on the third weekend of July and promises to bring fun and laughter and a touch of chaos. We are also very lucky to have the Romsey War Memorial Park central to the town which looks fabulous with the flower beds blooming and the ducks parading their ducklings around... but did you know from May until August we have a Sunday afternoon band session? Why not grab a picnic, some chairs and sit and enjoy the free entertainment, you can find out who is playing or even book up your band on our website.

September brings the popular Food Fair on the first Sunday of the month which brings local producers and independent traders to showcase and sell their wares in the centre of Romsey.

Don't forget to come and pursue the markets which are on Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays in the Market Place and Corn Market and Hampshire Market on the first of every month behind Waitrose.

Throughout the year there are often opportunities for spaces on the market. Do you have a starter business you are wanting to test out or maybe you would you like to start selling a product of a hobby of yours? This would be the perfect opportunity to try things out and meet new customers.

If you have a business in the local Romsey district, have you thought about joining the Romsey and District Chamber of Commerce? Members range from big locally based companies to entrepreneurial startups all who want Romsey to thrive. 


This fantastic day out for all the family is a recipe of delight, Romsey will be bustling with over 60 stalls full of local food & drink produce.
